Your recently organized USCS Hampton Roads Chapter #63 is assuming the task of servicing envelopes for naval cover collectors for events taking shape in this area. Delivery of envelopes to the ships concerned may be accomplished smoothly especially when events are rescheduled or new ships are assigned to the Recover Force. Your covers will be mailed to Recovers ships not located in this area. Norfolk is the homeport for many of the Recovery ships and should ship changes occur our liaison with the Navy will insure better results. Should the event be delayed your covers will be held for the word from the Public Information Officer.

Start the count down. . . . for Major Leroy G. Cooper's Project Mercury 18-orbit mission to outer space scheduled in April, 1963.

Collectors desiring naval covers cancelled aboard approximately 20 U.S. Navy ships assigned to the Atlantic Fleet to commemorate the U.S. Main-in-Space event and recovery may participate by observing the following procedures:

- 1. Two cover limit per ship not to exceed 50 covers per collector.
- 2. Special requests for autographs, photographs er cachets cannot be serviced.
- 3. Covers received without at least 5 cents U.S. postage will not be serviced. Postage of the United Nations is not valid except at the UN post office.
- 4. Some ships have cachets and we will encourage them to use them.
- 5. Covers received after 20 March will be serviced as circumstances permit or held over for the next event.
- 6. No responsibility is assumed by the Navy or personnel connected with this program, in the event covers are lost, delayed or not returned.

A few significant points are: (1) Results cannot be guaranteed due to ever present possibility of the event being delayed, rescheduled or re-assignment of Recovery Force ships (2) We, who are in the Navy realize that time and money is spent by collectors in trying to obtain complete Recovery Force coverage. The Navy is proud of her role in the Mercury Program but it is impractical to guarantee full coverage or even complete postmarks. (3) The newly chartered Universal Ship Cancellation Society - Hampton Roads Chapter will try to obtain collector service on future events scheduled in this area (4) Navy personnel are just not available to process nearly 4,000 requests. Therefore, it behooves the Hampton Roads Chapter, a part of the national organization, to take the initiative and share the burden imposed on the Navy.

Cover received: Mr. Werner Meister, 43 Essen Kray, Marienstrasse 64, Germany sends covers with cachet commemorating DAHLGREN(DLG-12) 1962 visit to Kiev; ZERSTORER-5(Ger,) and HMS LEOPARD/F14(Eng.) visit to Cuxhaven. German postage was used on all covers and Dahlgren's postmark cancelled the German postage. Envelopes were of the European quality and size. Very nice - thank you.

Did you know? After the U.S. second successful manned orbited spaceflight on May 24, 1962, the destroyer USS JOHN R. PIERCE recovered LCDR Scott Carpenter's spacecraft "AURORA 7".

"SHOOTING THE BREEZE"

The first U.S. stamp issued in 1847 was a five cent stamp. A letter weighing a ½ ounce was able to go 300 miles. A five center today will take a letter from one end of the United States to the other and accomodate 2 ounces of "Printed Matter" to certain other countries in the world. Briefly, let me say that postal rates in the U.S. are normally less than anywhere else. This is one of the many reasons for the tremendous gains naval cover collecting has been evident in the past two years.

SCUTTLEBUTT (Gossip)

At present there are no polaris subs operating in the Pacific. Plans to station the Proteus or the HOLLAND (AS-32) under construction would seem probable especially for the HOLLAND. USS THOMAS JEFFERSON may after her shakedown cruise be designated as the first U.S. polaris sub to operate in Pacific waters. Shakedown training may include shooting Polaris missiles off Cape Canaveral. Shakedown will commence as soon as the Jefferson is checked out and accepted by the Navy.

The first recognition of Antarctia as a true continent was established on the First U.S. sponsored expedition lead by Charles Wilkes, U.S. Navy (1838-42).

Antarctic Regions exceed 5,000,000 square miles, circular in shape and centers approximately about the earths geographic South Pole. It is the largest and the most complete desert in the world, a very cold one at that.

A complete chronology of some of the discoveries of this luring unknown land may be found in an encylcopedia at your public library.

Roald Amundsen, discover of the South Pole (Dec. 16,1911) made his find a few weeks before Capt. R.F. Scott(Eng.) and companians whose tragic end was certified by a searching party later the same year. RADM R.E. Byrd's(US) First Antarctic Expedition (1928) established "Little America" and his personal camp 100 miles inland. A third expedition in 1939 was made possible by a \$340,00 U.S. Government appropriation.

The U. S. Government as late as 1955, had not laid official claim to any Antarctic Territory. Byrd and other citizens had made numerous claims in behalf of the United States. The United States conception of the pie shaped wedges converging at the South Pole by other nations, namely France, Great B ritain, Argentina, Chile, Norway, Austrailia and New Zealand, is that claims should be based on actual occupation of territory rather than including a vast territory never seen by man was illogical.

*RADM George J. Dufek's 1956 RAD Skytrain landing at the South Pole with six other Navy men marked the beginning of annual U.S. Antarctic explorations.

Today hundreds of men, from 12 nations live the year around in Antarctica, many of them completely isolated in tetal darkness for months. McMurdo Station, the American science research headquarters is about 900 miles from the South Pole. During the long March to August winter screaming winds tear at 200 MPH and temperatures drop to minus 100°F and it becomes too cold for man, beast or machine.

Yet, for over a century of Antarctic Explorations, man is intriguingly beckoned to a land still locked in the Ice Age. This place of sheer, almost overpowering beauty, yields the world's greatest unspoiled scientific laboratory, extensive specimens and other vital technological data securely preserved in nature's freezer.

On behalf of industry, leading colleges and universities are conducting many migatory studies of fish and birds in this awesome land of beauty. Increased studies by the United States and Russia in oceanography and ocean currents continue to gather momentum annually, in an effort to explore this land of ice and snow.

Adventurers and scientists alike are attracted to this "Cruel Continent" and it's ever present beauty as a magnet is to steel.

Like the adventurers, collectors who desire the unusual in covers must pay the price. Planning ahead and doing painstaking research through reading and correspondence may bring results -unguaranteed results . . .

MARITIME MAIL By A. W. Mears -USCS 189

"PAQUEBOT", "POSTED ON THE HIGH SEAS", "SHIP LETTER" - these are only a few of the varied and interesting markings that may be obtained from merchantships. Covers with these markings may be divided into two types (1) official government cancels either shore station or ship post office and (2) ship or company markings.

The collector of these markings and cancels needs to be willing to do some research and to posess some measure of patience. The research depends mainly upon the section in which the collector lives. Having lived in or near seaports all my life, the shipping news in the daily paper is one of my main interests. To the "inland" collector I can only advise that most magazines carry advertisements of the various shipping companies. Cultivating your local travel agent will also pay dividends. Patience is necessary as covers quite often are a long time coming home.

When sending for covers I can only stress that the handling of covers is a courtesy on the part of hard-working ship personnel who quite often have never heard of our hobby. Make your request brief, but complete and don't request special favors. Quite often you will receive a brief note or a postcard of the ship from the chap handling your cover. If you know the ship's route send direct to the ship at various ports, allowing necessary travel time, otherwise send via the Head Office.

Some recent additions to my collection are listed to give some idea if the variety av ailable.

The Cunard Line uses at least four types of markings (1) R.M.S. QUEEN MARY uses a boxed three line cachet: HighSeas Mail/Posted on Board/RMS QUEEN MARY. My cover bears the Southampton(Eng.) Paquebot cancel. (2) R.M.S. ELIZABETH uses a two line cachet: Posted on Board/R.M.S. QUEEN ELIZABETH. This cover has the Cherbourge (Fr.) Paquebot cancel. (3) The CARMANIA also uses a two line cachet: HIGH SEAS MAIL/RMS CARMANIA. Covers bears Cobb(Eire) Paquebot. (4) SYLVANIA stamps "High Seas Mail" on covers along with ship's name stamp. The covers also has Halifax(N.S.) date stamp.

The ships of the Nord Deutscher Lloyd have official ship post offices. The T.S. Breman has an outstanding and interesting circular cancel this I have only noticed on envelopes containing German Stamps.

The Canadian Pacific ships use a four line cachet: Posted on board the British/ship" ______"/ on the High Seas/ Date _____. Covers from these ships also have various Canadian and British shore cancels. Unusual items sometimes result from covering the various cruises.

The BATORY of the Polish Ocean Lines and the NIEUW AMSTERDAM of the Holland-America Line also have official ship post offices, the Nieuw Amsterdam uses her cancel as a cachet unless Dutch Stamps are used.

Two American ships that have distinctive cachets are the UNITED STATES and the AMERICA of the U.S. Line. My latest cover from the America was returned via Bremerhaven (Ger.) with an additional two line cachet Auf See eingeliefert/Naivre Paquebot.

These are only a few of the possibilities. Good Luck and good covers ! ! ! P.S. Thank you Art.

EDITOR'S VIEWPOINT

San Marino is the world's oldest republic and independent country in Europe. Fleeing from a marty's death in a Rome Colisseum, St. Marinus founded this tiny republic in the 4th century.

San Marino is an appealing country to tourists but more especially to stamp collectors. Thirty percent of San Marino's income is derived from stamps. They deliberately create "stamp errors" and engage in many tricks of the trade to render high catalogue values worthless.

My intention here is not to evaluate San Marino's stamp business but to impress you with the significance of a word. Yes, a word whose very utterance is the nectar of our freedom, in fact the very soul.

I cannot remember ever reading any material concerning San Marino that didn't mention the word - republic.

Communists abhor the word otherwise they wouldn't embrace socialism. Much of our own literature today seldoms refers to this Nation that I love best as a "republic." There is no substitute in United States History and the American way of life for the word - republic. It means: "A state in which the supreme power rests in the body of citizens entitled to vote and is exercised by representatives directly or indirectly chosen by them."

Why, then do stamp collectors buy more stamps from this tiny republic than from the other five leading postage stamp sized countries in Europe?

The answer is a simple one. Some stamps produced by San Marino commemorate great men such as Washington, Franklin and Italy's own Garibaldi. The recognition of these republic fathers makes the topical collector eager to acquire "Rep. Di San Marino" commemoratives. Everyone who loves peace and freedom wants to share in recognizing the champions of liberty. Moreover, we as Americans select stamps that depict our heritage. Topical collectors are not therefore necessarily concerned with values but with beauty instead.

The pen is mightier than the sword but it does not give our writers the right to energize a sinuous meaning by using other adjectives that do not measure up. The magic of letters arouse the emotions of mankind - joy or sorrow, love or hate - and can give enduring quality of depth and meaning. Our liberties are safe until the memories and experiences of the past are blotted out. . . .

"OPERATION EQUALANT" U.S. COAST AND GEODETIC SERVICE SHIP -Explorer and 13 other ships from five other countries including Russia will rendezvous on the Atlantic Ocean at the equator. A highlight in this joint venture, to study ocean currents and gather seawater samples, will be to particularly study countercurrents known to exist where such as the one that bucks the powerful Gulf Stream. Setting sail Feb 1st from Norfolk, Explorer will be enroute Dakar, Senegal and start operations from there about the 15th. Refueling is contemplated at Freetown, Sierra Leone and at Receife, Brazil about March 15th. Then, retracing her route she is expected to return to Norfolk, Virginia in April. Captain John C. Bull is Master and will be accompanied by Dr. Erik Hagmeir, biologist from Germany's Kiel University to study the known and unknown currents of the Atlantic.
