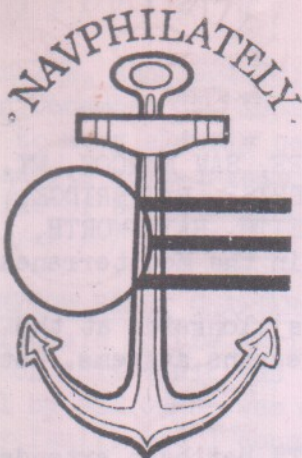

Military Sea Transportation Service exists to provide sea transportation for personnel and cargo of the Department of Defense. This does not include personnel and cargo transported by Fleet Units. Among other things MSTS provides support ships for scientific programs, and to be expandable in time of war.

MSTS is classed as a fleet under the command of a vice admiral and a component of the Navy's operating forces. Approximately 110 ships designated USNS (United States Naval Ship) are manned by officers and crewman who are employees under the regulations governing U.S. Civil Service employees.

Three Navy manned transports are the USS MANN (T-AP-112), MITCHELL (T-AP-114) and BRECKENBRIDGE (T-AP-176) also comprise this MSTS Fleet.

MSTS ships supply some points where a commercial ship would have very little reason to visit. Transporting tanks, dependents of military personnel, household effects, automobiles and troops are some of the jobs performed by MSTS ships. Some commercial ships do carry military cargos but the higher commercial shipping charges keep MSTS in business.

Established in 1949, USNS ships didn't have to wait long to keep. First Korea, then a sealift of 300,00 fleeing Vietnamese who preferred freedom to communism, ships later became a haven for fleeing Hungarian refugees, supplies transported during the Berlin Crisis, logistic support to UN Congo operations and much more.

MSTS is particularly proud of its support furnished to Arctic posts. Last year, USNS ALATNA (T-AOG-81), a tanker with a specially fitted icebreaker hull and the Navy icebreaker USS BURTON ISLAND (AGB-1) hauled petroleum into Greenland. USNS REDBUD (T-AKL-398) assisted the Navy in repairing submerged petroleum lines at the Greenland site.

A fleet of special project ships which are used to explore the frontiers of space and probe ocean depths is coming into a reality.

In the space field MSTS tracking ships are equipped with telemetry, data processing and radio instruments as well as recovery facilities for returning nose cones. USNS RANGE RECOVERER (T-AG-2) and RANGE TRACKER along with five others converted from World War II victory ships form the MSTS missile tracking and nose cone recovery fleet.

USNS KINGSPORT .. unique ship with a unique mission. The world's first satellite communications ship has now officially joined the fleet. The (T-AG-164) originally an 18 year old Victory-type cargo ship named for a city in Tennessee has a new profile. The new profile is dominated by a 52 foot pressurized radome, set on top of the deck house. As a mobile communications satellite terminal, KINGSPORT will operate in many waters, processing satellite data.

She has been stationed off the West Coast of Africa to track Syncom I which has for a time been lost in

LITTLE ROCK (CLG-4) for the last 11 months has weathered all storms alongside at the Norfolk Naval Shipyard undergoing extensive modifications to her weapons systems. Getting set for shakedown cruise.

The deadline for selling the 35,000 ton battleship USS MASSACHUSETTS has been extended by the Navy to 1 April. Citizens of the Pine Tree State are attempting to raise money to purchase their namesake. Massachusetts is in the Reserve Fleet (inactive) at Norfolk.

Collectors are reminded as well as individuals that sponsor cachets do not have business or personal funds to carry on a large volume of correspondence. Also most events at the Electric Boat Co., Groton, Conn are delayed.

CHANGE OF DUTY - W.W. GLENN, PCC, USN has been transferred to the INDEPENDENCE. Chief Glenn did an outstanding job of selling the Navy during his tour aboard Enterprise.

ABOUT CACHETS - Some ships are still using the "Sixty years of Destroyers" cachet which should have been discontinued December 31st.

ABOUT STAMPS - The Post Office Department has announced the released of an 8¢ Amelia Earhart Commemorative Stamp on July 24th. A few of us will remember the search for the lost American aviatrix, while the rest of us don't want to remember how ancient we are growing. Congress awarded her the Distinguished Flying Cross - the only woman so honored. On July 1, 1937, accompanied by Capt. Fred J. Noonan, the plane was flying over open waters toward Howland Island, 2,556 miles away. The pair were never heard from and no wreckage was found. The ships USS ONTARIO, SWAN AND LEXINGTON participated in the unsuccessful rescue and recovery. Covers postmarked between 26 June and July 1937 may be considered valid to commemorate this event.

NEW CONSTRUCTION AND CONVERSIONS ANNOUNCED - The Cold War has gone to sea. The Cuban Situation definitely teaches us that expanding Soviet sea power renews the obvious need for more ships and greater vigilance. Congress has approved construction of 41 new ships and almost as many conversions in 1964. A polaris submarine will be stationed in the Mediterranean within the next two months. In my opinion, deployment of atomic submarines to vast regions of ice and snow is very probable. Increased surveillance of the Arctic and Antarctic continents are caused by communism moving into geographical areas directly influenced by the sea.

NAVY DAY - was established by the Navy League in 1922 and is celebrated every year on the 27th of October - the birthday of Theodore Roosevelt and also the day on which in 1775 the Continental Congress received a bill providing for the creation and establishment of a Fleet. The Navy League believes than an observance of this kind - voluntary in nature and under civilian sponsorship - is most appropriate for honoring the men and women of the United States Navy and Marine Corps. The Navy is authorized to participate in the NAVY DAY observance to the extent of having "open house" at its installations and aboard ships, but the major emphasis has been that it is a civilian tribute by a civilian organization without the expenditure of tax dollars.

USCS HAMPTON ROADS CHAPTER #63 - Your newly elected Chapter President conferred last month with officials of the Mariner's Museum, in the company of (USCS)own William Delany. The purpose of this visit was to organize a permanent naval cover exhibit at the museum. Approval by all hands was appreciated.

After my family and I consumed some of Mrs. Delany's superb roast beef (Naturally, the kids said the apple pie and ice cream were the best)- Mr. Delany and I reviewed hundreds of fine covers in the museum library. Most of these covers belonged to the collection of Mr. Bayliss.

An exhibit of permanent value will require many hours of research, cataloging, mounting, write-ups and construction of display frames. The frames are to be constructed in such a manner as to allow exhibits to be portable and make theme changes quickly. Exhibit frames that are donated by private individuals or groups will bear an engraved brass plate bearing the donor's name.

Many months of hard work by your new chapter will be climaxed by a 1963 Exhibition. A souvenir envelope, cacheted in color and postmarked aboard a visiting Navy ship is being considered. Navy Day, October 27, 1963 is our target date. Several Navy men in this area have indicated a desire to help on weekends and the ball is rolling.

The committee to be appointed to coordinate these efforts needs your support and wants all USCS members to be a part of this program. Recruitment of workers has begun but we need your experience, views and moral support. Assistance is needed for the souvenir envelope design. Others may help by sending in suggestions concerning mounting covers and frame construction. Many "old timers" who have had experience exhibiting covers at shows are invited to write and share their experience with us. For example, what should our theme be on Navy Day? My personal belief is that this permanent museum display will encourage thousands of travellers and visitors to collect naval covers.

If you want to help write me and tell me what task your best suited. Advisors are needed for Space and Nuclear displays. A cachet coordinator to select appropriate designs is needed. Exhibit frames are urgently required and these designs should consider weight, security, size and maneuverability.

Because it will be difficult in some instances for the postal clerk to give you a complete postmark. Protect those envelope corners when packaging too.

## EDITOR'S VIEWPOINT

During the past year my correspondence with so many fine people in the U. S. and abroad has made my task of bringing you the news a delight.

My family shares your joys and sorrows. Without their love, patience and encouragement my efforts would fail. May, I say that my family is tops, and who else would put up with my mess, moods, and share my hobby of providing you with the news. Even the mailman has the right to complain - a mail call seldom passes without a few letters.

My philatelic interests first lead me to stamps and I never have been able to include covers. Why? Well because I haven't found the time for stamps or covers due to the correspondence and Navphilately. Someday, when I get to cantankerous to put out a paper and get settled down in my retired pasture, depending upon the availability of work at retirement time, and cost of living at that time. The stamps that are purchased or received are carefully protected and stowed away until that day arrives. Utilizing my spare time with my stamp and cover accumulations will be some consolation.

Billy (14) followed me by beginning a Scouts on Stamps collection for the purpose of earning a merit badge in scouting. Next was Blanche (13) whose topical focused on Israel. David (7) has been interested from the very start but it's my fault, he isn't organized yet. Then, the better half, my faithful and loving wife broke the ice and hinted she might collect flowers on stamps. Her current idea was suggested by a fellow collector Geo. D. Rose (Des Moines). Mr. Rose sent us a slide containing a picture made from stamps. Polly had the outline of a large American eagle on white poster paper. Correspondence from collectors further indicates greater activity in the procurement of naval covers ships engaged in Oceanographic work. Several teachers write that their students are especially eager to travel with our Navy and digest history, geography, current events and now science. Can you imagine a classroom of students sufficiently motivated to painlessly absorb these dry texts. How is it done? By creating enthusiasm in reading and writing, this adept teacher has actually caused her pupils to discover new adventures. Most every child is inclined and willing to engage in adventures. Some adventures are attended with risk requiring courage. Speaking about adventures I am reminded of some my own. My high school math teacher, who when angered shook her fist at me and clearly bellowed "Bill Skelley - you see this it means six months in the hospital." Then, shaking the other she eloquently pronounced "this one means sure death."

## CAPTAIN ESPERANZA'S ACHIEVEMENT

Oceanography, the science that studies all the phenomena common to the ocean. Oceanography integrates the marine sciences and deals with such problems as the boundaries of the oceans, the composition of sea water, the topography of the basin floor and the character of the sediments found there, and marine biology.

Oceanography as a science began to develop after 1900. Up to that time soundings were taken only along the shores of the various nations and data concerning such matters as reefs, fishing banks, currents and winds were obtainable only from ship's logs. The Challenger Expedition (1872-76) marked the beginning of organized research. In 1902 an International Council for the study of the sea was organized. Numerous expeditions have since added much detailed information (Refer to Navphilately Feb & Dec issues). Although as late as 1945 there were areas in the Pacific and Indian oceans for which there was no accurate information, or only information of conditions during certain seasons.

Some of my own personal experiences in oceanography include a tour of duty aboard the USS NOXUBEE (AOG-56) during August 1946. We found the rugged coast deeply indented with numerous bays and inlets and swept by the Labrador Current.

Our mission to refuel the U.S. Army Base at Goose Bay, Labrador. During this mission NOXUBEE made five shuttle trips through poorly charted, narrow waters, and swift unpredictable currents up to 6 knots with few and untrustworthy navigational aids. NOXUBEE provided safe routing and passage for the USS PAWCATUCK (AO-108), drawing 32 feet, by preceding her with continuous soundings to a safe anchorage in Hamilton Inlet.

NOXUBEE traversed the longest of these inlets. Hamilton Inlet, a might fiord which penetrates into the land for 200 miles. Goose Bay is located on the Hamilton River.

Lieutenant Walter Esperanza, U.S. Navy (now retired) was Commanding. Captain Esperanza had to overcome a serious range problem and time was of utmost importance. In bays or estuaries the tidal wave tends to pile up and the range may be as great as 50 feet ( Bay of Fundy). As most harbors are located in bays, the great range creates a harbor problem and sedimentation of the channel may occur.

Some additional information concerning one of the Atlantic Ocean currents are of particular interest.\*\*The Gulf Stream, largest of the ocean currents moves northward along the United States coast to Delaware and then turns northeastward; off Labrador, it becomes the North Atlantic Drift. As the North Atlantic Drift, it moves northeastward and carries warm water to the shores of Great Britain and Scandinavia. Oceanographers estimate that it takes three years for a single rotation.

PAWCATUCK because of her deep draft was unable to proceed beyond her station near the mouth of the Hamilton River. NOXUBEE shuttled aviation gasoline between the PAWCATUCK and the base up river. Speed had to be reduced considerably and each destination had to be accomplished with the tide.

Captain Esperanza was an excellent navigator, his knowledge of seamanship and ship handling was the reason we overcame both extreme and unknown hazards safely. The crew's morale never wavered under the most precarious circumstances. These operations are believed to have been the first of large U.S. Navy ships in this area. Thus, a valuable contribution to the knowledge of the area for future operations. He charted NOXUBEE's zigzag tract compelled by contrary winds and currents through these dangerous waters. He performed a service to our Nation which he loves and served honorably and faithfully. Captain Esperanza worked his way up through the ranks and made a favorable impression on me. Perhaps, more so than any other skipper I had the pleasure to serve. Why? - A man of sterling worth.

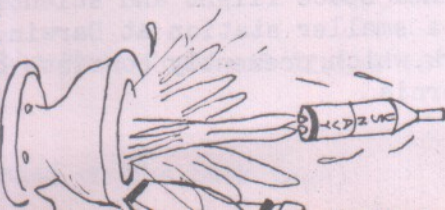
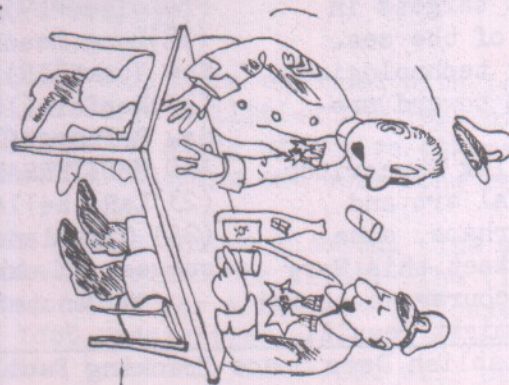
SOLANT AMITY IV - Since 1960 Solant Amity ships have made 58 visits to 37 ports in 25 nations. Amity IV consisting of 3 ships (Spiegel Grove, VanVoorhis and J.K.Taussig) wi will visit Freetown, Sierra Leona 4-6 March. April will mean visits to the ports of Lourenco Marques, Diego Suarez, Dar es Salaam and Mombassa and others. The goodwill, medical supplies, clothing and shoes distributed by Amity ships supports the People-to-People Program. This is made possible by Americans donating these supplies and goods.

So here is a report on some of the Navy's oldest landing ships which were built during the last world war. Propelled by diesel engines these 328 ft. landing ships have a speed of about 10 knots these 11 ships will become LST Squadron TWO and will be placed in a "commission in reserve" status at Norfolk Ready and standing by - if needed for an amphibious invasion or anything else. These ships will be fully manned, loaded and at sea within a matter of hours.

SHIPS IN THE NEWS. . . . ### PROJECT MERCURY EVENT DELAYED

Periodicals report Astronaut Cooper's flight postponed until May 1963. Some collectors report his 18-22 orbit ride - the longest yet by an American astronaut may even be delayed until June.

### U.S. ATOMIC POWERED MERCHANT SHIP:

Savannah has port of entry approval to visit Greece, Netherlands and West Germany. Foreign collectors and friends of ship mail here is a chance to help with some might fine covers. Write me earliest date if you will help.

POLARIS SUBMARINES - Three Polaris A-sub are destined to report for Med duty about 1 April and probably operated from Rota, Spain. These subs may be the first Polaris craft to give their crews liberty on foreign shores when deployed. Messdeck scuttlebutt (gossip) has it that the submarines may enter Turkish ports to give evidence that Turks are still protected by U.S. nuclear weapons. Withdrawal of 30 Jupiters from Italy and 15 from Turkey and 60 Thor missiles from Britain is in progress. It is interesting to note that in only four years the Jupiter missiles are obsolete weapons by the Navy's Polaris missiles, mounted on submarines which have an 1800 mile range (300 greater than Jupiters or Thors). Polaris submarines can fire rockets at targets in Russia from below the surface of the sea. Just think of the progress and technological advancement the U.S. is making toward preserving a world peace.
