FOREIGN ANTARCTIC EXPEDITIONS ANNOUNCED: Unfortunately US cover collectors interested in foreign polar covers most of the time receive the "word" too late as to make a cover event incomplete or even insure a successful attempt. This problem is the responsibility of each and every collector and it is placed on his or her shoulders to furnish the information, if and when available, to some editor who in turn can make it available to the multitude. Maybe someday we will get organized but for some reason it appears almost to be an impossibility. To eliminate confusing you will a lot of details and different ways to obtain some more polar covers here is something that you can do and expect some measure of success. A French Polar Expedition now enroute to Australia and points South are aboard the Danish Ship THALA DAN and it has a philatelist for a skipper. He will apply the special cachet for this year"s expedition until about 20 Jan 1964 to covers. He also requests that you use some nice commemoratives on your outer wrapper or envelopes. Write to: Captain. Danish Polar Ship THALA DAN, c/o Consulat de France, Hobard, Tasmania, Australia. Covers must bear Australian, French or Danish Stamps. The Australian covers bearing Danish stamps will be posted from Hobart, Brench from LeHarve in March and the covers bearing Danish stamps from Denmark upon completion of the cruise. One IRC is generally sufficient payment to pre-pay the required foreign postage needed on covers marked: Surface Mail The other expedition is a Belgian-Dutch expedition departing Belgium about December 8th aboard the Danish ship MAGGA DAN returning the same time as the THALA DAN next year. Write tos Monsieur le Chef du Bureau de Poste, Base Antarctique Belge via Brussels X, Belgium or to the Captain, Navire Polar Danish Ship MAGGA DAN, c/o Bureau de Poste, Brussels. X, Belgium before the sailing date. Be certain to include covers bearing foreign stamps or IRC°s to prepay the postage on each cover requested. Airmail to these overseas destinations is recommended and advised. MOST IMPORTANT: : : U.S. postage is not valid on covers mailed or posted from foreign ships or territories. REMEMBER they must bear sufficient postage each way. Mail destined for foreign countries must be prepaid otherwise guess work and here comes that postage due. This issue rounds out another year reporting and gathering ship cover news. A review of the 1963 USCS scoreboard indicates success in all facets of ship cover collecting with the space bugs rubbing elbows with the deep water sailors.

Vincent and yours truly launching USCS Hampton Roads Chapter #63. Early news releases are important as ever and everyone is urged to keep this in mind with the approach of Gemini and the 1964 season. The loss of Andy Fernandez and Miss Lorraine Carlson reduced the willing and able hands in the USCS workshop. W.W. Sloan slipped into the ballpark hitting two runs Coral Sea Celebration and SOUTHERLAND cachets(Whoops - er Jaygee - Sir). Art Mears from Canada keeps plugging right field with informative ship write-ups. Third baseman, T.G. Nicholson coming into the league in 32 slapped a couple of runs with local ship event cachets and by the way his batting average 32-63 seasons "You never got a bum cancel from Nick" Ray DuBeau helped keep the score by shooting in news items. Geo Finn, USCS PIO keeps covers in the lime-light. Howard Koeppen - USCS 1st base magician keeps us from going in the red and swats those rookie memberships like crazy. Lt. Joyce, USS ANDREW JACK-SON and LT Swengel, USS DACE doctored the injured players with two more cachet runs. J.R. Alexandre, New Zealand protected the outfieldwith ship cover servicing. A.L. Groeneveld, Rotterdam continues to make visiting U.S. servicemen feel at home in Holland. Ulrich Naumann, W.Germany, a good second baseman and his "SCHIFFSPOST NEWS" gives European coverage. From the active retired's W.T. Gmahle, Tampa umpired the first in a series of "Know your ships" contests - Well Done, J.R. Fitzpatrick of Spacecraft covers rigged up the Space Stamps Contest. Next came Mrs. Fager, Tampa and Mrs. Zirkind, Teaneck, N.J. slugging for more USCS Chapters. The boys of the infield (Detroit & Windsor, Canada) along with Ed. Lameck popped up with Dobbins Chapter #20. Ray Costa, Don Schultz, Bill Luctege, Walter Zapchenk, Ray St. John and Bill Luckett kept filling in as we retired the sides. The series closed with LCDR S.J. Sowinski, U.S. Navy, CO-SURFBIRD (ADG-383) giving us the winning run we needed to cop the series. His outstanding triple-decker- selling the Navy - promoting the peopleto-people program - and his "coupe de maitre" with the pen on those "Honorary Shipmate" certificates - executed a high stardard of Navy-community relations.

U.S.A.F.S. GENERAL H.H. ARNOLD - Art Mears_Contributing writer... USCS #189

The largest missile tracking ship in the world was placed in commission by the U.S. Air Force at Cape Canaveral on May 1, 1963. The gleaming white and grey vessel, a converted troop transport that saw service in two wars, was named GENERAL H.H. ARNOLD in honor of the air force pioneer.

It was early in 1960 in 1960 that the need for missile tracking ships was suggested by Robert W. Jaque, the range co-ordinator for Sperry Rand. A group of specialists was formed to study the problem. The group included management and engineering specialists from the several units of Sperry-Rand and the UNIVAC Division. Later groups were added from International Telephone and Telegraph, Gibbs and Cox, the naval architects and Bethlehem Steel's Shipbuilding Division. The final result of their conferences was a nine volume recommendation, or well over a foot of books.

In July 1961, a contract was signed calling for Sperry to manage the conversion and instrumentation of two missile tracking ships for the Air Force.

Six days later, the troopship R.E. Callan was taken out of stowage (mothballs) at Tomkin's Cove and towed to Bethlehem's Brooklyn Yard for conversion.

In twenty-one months the ship was ready: a major ship construction project that included hull modification, quarters for a 200 man crew, installing radar, instruments and a complete navigation system.

As shipfitters, welders and painters worked on the hull over eighty miles of cable was installed, connected to 540 "black boxes" that make the instrumentation. Three turbine generators, rated at 6,000 watts, were included to supply power for the system.

The decks were covered by an array of telemetry, radar and communication antennas as well as huge structures housing weather radar and star tracker systems.

Originally classed as a Mobile Atlantic Range Station(MARS) the ship was reclassified as an Advanc Range Instrumentation Ship(ARIS).

The GENERAL ARNOID, a converted C4-S-Al troopship, is of 14,300 tons displacement, full load, or 10,500 tons, light, on dimensions of 520 x 72 x 25 feet. She is rated at 17.3 knots and carries 2,000 tons of fuel oil. Among the many features are the "six-in-one" Integrated Instrumentation Radar, the telemitry antenna, a navigation system similar to the one used in Navy Polaris submarines, Univac for data processing, a complete weather station and an optical system to remove the errors caused by the twisting and bending of the steel hull between the various systems. The ship can carry food and fuel for a six month cruise.

Through the courtesy of Sterling Cameron of Bethlehem's Brooklyn Yard, I received a cover from this ship. It was postmarked at Cape Canaveral, Florida and has a square cachet showing a missile encircling the globe. Around the upper section of the globe is the ship's name, USAFS GEN. H.H. ARNOID, The cover is autographed by the ship's master.

The Oct meeting of a local stamp club was an unusual experience for me and I will attempt to pass along briefly what happened. In the lobby, I was confronted by a man, who from his outward appearance, I would have never picked him out in a crowd as a philatelist. Spending a few minutes in chatter, he revealed to me that he had received a letter from a girl friend bearing the new 5¢ E. Roosevelt commemorative. He was careful not to diviluge too much information about the girl or the source of the new stamp scheduled to be issued the following Saturday. The man, however, was most anxious to learn in an equally deceiving manner, if he had a philatelic treasure. I assurred him that he did not own anything of the sort. Finally, after much questioning on his part, I learned that he had concocted the story about the girl and had by accident actually purchased 10 of the new stamps from a local postal clerk. He knew little about philately but the knowledge he had gave him some wild and fancy speculative notions. The only good that came out of this discussion was an ideal for you folks that collect for relaxation. What do you think of putting the new 5¢ E. Roosevelt plus an FDR commemorative on cover and obtaining the USS F.D. ROOSEVELT(CVA-42) postmark?(FPO, N.Y.) Covers bearing cancellation dates on stamps before the First Day of Issue are not uncommon and least of all Speculative. Oh well.

Japanese Submarine: CYASHIO(SS-511) High Speed, Deep Dive - snorkel submarine......
Laid down 25 Dec 1957, launched 25 May 1958, commissioned 30 June 1960, Builder: Kawasaki Dockyard Co., Kobe, Japan. Commanded by: CDR O. IWAMCTO - 8 officers and 57 enlisted.
All Japanese military forces are combined under the title of "Japanese Military Self-Defense Force" and their military fores are therefore not broken down like ours. OYASHIO is the first Japanese sub built since WW II and named for the great current surrounding the northern part of Japan. She is used in ASW training and submarine crew training. She is assigned to the First Division, JMSDF. HAYASHIO and WAKASHIO - two newer subs that were completed in 1962. A newer and larger type sub class was projected in 1961 but atomic energy may be forthcoming instead of another conventional. Definite plans, are underway. Thanks to H.Y.H. Chang and T.C. Miller, Jr..



NAVY DESIGNS SEAGOING PAD TO LAUNCH SATELLITES AT SEA.....Resembling some futuristic battle wagon, the navy is proposing a satellite-launching ship, designed by the Navy's Bureau of Ships. What is envisioned is a 17,700 ton ship with an overall length of 565 feet and a 76 foot beam. It would cruise 10,000 miles at 20 knots. Bulging above deck, a hangar aft hourses up to three satellite-launching rockets. One at a time, they are erected and fired from a launcher hanging out over the stern. Another bulge, forward, serves as a blockhouse during the countdown. Stabilizing tanks and an oversize rudder linked to an autopilot, steady the ship enough for launching while underway at 15 knots, in a sea with waves up to five feet. Such a craft would have important advantages over the present U.S. launching sites in Flordia and California. Roaming the globe, it could put up a satellite from anywhere.

Do you want a stamp column? FOREIGN SHIP COVERS AND MARKINGS + + + + + + + Bill Luetge USCS #3938...... Here is the first in a series of articles on foreign ship markings or postal markings, These markings are somewhat different from those used by T.S. Navy postal facilities and ships. Generally, they may be considered to fall into two basic categories: (1) Ships having a device to cancel postage AND (2) Ships not having a device to cancel postage but use some other postal activity or source. Ships in this category usually have a ship's stamp, seal or insignia that they will apply to collector covers. Prepare your covers in the same manner that you would for U.S. ships. It is most import= ant to apply postage stamps of the country (rather than U.S. postage) on the covers that you want returned. Collectors report best cancellation results are obtained from foreign ships by using a stiff envelope filler inside your unsealed covers. Enclose a brief but courteous note (printed or typewritten) in English and/or a foreign language. It is recommended that you do not confuse the receiptient aboard ship by asking for unusual cover service such as autographs and colored cancels. Shipboard personnel are most willing to assist you, if they understand what you want. Commemorative stamps are most always appreciated by the crew and tends to encourage better relationship. This month let's start with some Belgian ships. Send your covers bearing valid Belgium postage stamps to: Capitaine, (Name of the ship), c/o Naval Force, Ostende, Belguim, Ships know to have some ship or postal marking are: Fregatte Adrien De Gerlache; Fregatte A.F. Current Belgian postage may be procured from almost any dealer or direct from the Belgian Philatelic Sales Office. Write to: Director Posts, 162 Ave. Bogier, Brussels, Belgium and include an IRC(International Reply Coupon) to obtain a copy of the latest sales order blank, Postal Rates: Printed Matter - Unsealed envelopes containing absolutely blank fillers - 1 Franc. Surface Mail - 6 Francs. Airmail is expensive and not recommended. Several weeks or months may elapse before foreign covers are returned. Collectors desiring to submit more detailed information on these ships or have knowledge of other ship markings are invited to send details to: W.J. Luetge, 3211 North 44th Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin 53216. Pertinent information will then be passed on to other collectors for the mutual benefit of all. 


