ARCHIMEDE - French Bathyscape Several months before the tragic loss of THRESHER, France issued a 30Fr stamp Scott # 1052 commemorating her new bathyscape. It was launched July 27, 1961 and named she began her career. A bathyscape is a watertight hull with windows(ports to a swabbie) in which men can decend into the sea depths to study the plants and animals there. The U.S. Navy's Trieste now in San Diego completed her role in the Thresher search but the Archimede now in South America may resume further Thresher studies next spring where the Trieste left off. Submarine cover collectors may have considered their albums closed insofar as Thresher was concerned. A friend has sent me a beautifully cacheted French FDC of Archimede. What do you think? Will Archimede occupy a place in you album of submarine covers? Can the Thresher story be complete without it, if she takes up the search. TIME CAPSULE ... About a year ago, the philatelic press as well as most of our Nation's newspapers carried the Hammarskjold Stamp error as bid news. Temporarily collectors forgot about the great statesman as they examined their stamp stock and waited for the Post Office Department's decision, while looking for the reported discovery on cover. This year some curosity was aroused with the postponement of the Audubon stamp as reported in Linn's Dec 9th and 16th issues but seemed to vanish for the most part with the announced rescheduled date of December 7th. However, what hasn't yet been revealed by anyone that I know of is that these new beauties might bear close examination, It is not my intention to create a reckless furor but to invite your curosity to do some research of your own. Research is defined by Webster as: careful, systematic study and investigation in some field of knowledge, undertaken to establish facts or principles - to do study, Some collectors of U.S. Stamps own errors that probably have never been reported but the chap who had a whole sheet of Hammarskjold errors made the fatal mistake o f collector a wealth of rubber stamped postal Housing and Community errors received \$208.00

or illustrated markings. Covers desired from per stamp or \$10,400 - a silent profit don't you agree. Printed Matter-Covers unsealed with a plain filler with the flap tucked inside need 20Pf postage. Surface mail(by ship also) will require 40 Pf and airmail is 60Pf per half-ounce. Covers desired returned by airmail service should be so marked otherwise they will return via surface mail. The currency breakdown is as follows: 100 Pf = 1 mark about 25¢ US and there are approxpiately 4.2 marks to the dollar. So you can see that airmail from the U.S. (IRC) are available at most US post offices @ .11¢ each. These IRC's are reedeemable for the ordinary letter rate(surface rate) to the country in which it was purchased i.e., A 60Pf West German IRC is redeemed for only 11 cents in cash or stamps. Use them in lieu of small checks or money orders. West Germany has a philatelic agency which may be your spurce of stamps. Write: Federal Ministry of Posts and Telecommunications, Koblenstrasse 8I, Bonn, W. Germany but I prefer to mingle with the large number of W. German collectors and swap covers for stamps that I need. When writing to the German Philatelic Agency send along one IRC to obtain a philatelic sales order blank and instructions. This article

A lesson learned The West Chesapeake Post Office had the new Audubon commem on sale, Saturday, Nov 30th the day after the originally planned first day of issue. I purchased a sheet of these new beauties and used almost a full sheet on letters to USCS prospects as a result of Linn's favorable publicity. The following Monday the Air Station Postal Clerk informed me the new 5¢ commemorative had bee withdrawn and wouldn't be issued. Telephoning the various base postal facilities on the story was the same but the reasons varied and the possibility of errors could not be overlooked ... Here, I was with a PB of six and a few singles of a stamp that had been on sale for only one day and then suddenly and mysteriously withdrawn from sale ... By Friday the FDC's had not been received but the local population was out on a stamp hunt. Word had leaked out and some folks were known to have driven 100 miles seeking the mysterious but beautiful stamp My dilemna was relieved somewhat as the PMG announced postponment of the First Day of Issue to Dec 7th..another memorable day in our history .. What lesson did I learn??? Never to use a sheet of new stamps until they have been in circulation for a few months at least .. Never did I really believe that I had a philatelic find but what would you think if you were in my shoes.

NEW SHIP CONSTRUCTION NOTES LPD-6 is the second ship to be named for the third largest city in Minnesota. DULUTH, for whom the city is named, was a French explorer who in 1679 raised the French Flag at the western most point of Lake Superior. Navy amphibious transport docks are named for U.S. cities whose namesakes were explorers and developers of America. Ships in this class are 521 feet long and displace 13,900 tons fully loaded. Tops speed is in excess of 20 knots and will be armed with 4-3inch, 50 caliber twin gun mounts. LPD's are manned by 30 officers and 460 enlisted men and can carry 930 troops and 2,000 tons of supplies and equipment. Keel laid at New York Naval Shipyard on December 18th

Reconversion contracts Three ships to be converted are the USS MISPILLION(AO-105). PASSUMPSIC(AO-107) and PAWCATUCK(AO-108) at American Shipbuilding Company, Lorain and Toledo, Ohio. The conversion will consist of installing new mid-bodies to increase the cargo capacity of pumps and deck equipment and installation of an auxiliary machinery plant. The new mid-bodies will extend the lengths of the ships by about 93 feet giv giving them an overall length of 644 feet, a beam of 75 feetand a full load displacement of 34,600 tons. Editor's note: Noxubee and Pawcatuck both engaged in oceanographic in 1946 in Laborador and both were relatively new ships at that time. Now the Pawacatuck is having a reconversion job to streamline and modernize the Navy's tanker requirements. How do I know I was there. * READINESS - MORE THAN A STATE OF MIND *

What, then, is readiness?

Yes, the state of being ready: to be prepared to act immediately; to be willing; to be prompt; to be destrous; to be available. The dictionary is quite explicit.

We use the term constantly. "The Seventh Fleet is our ready power for peace in the Western Pacific." The Navy is ready for any eventuality from limited aggression to an all out war."

But -- what do we mean? What does it take to make a sailor, a ship, the Navy - ready? Start with the sailor: basic training, yes, and uniforms, a service record, health record, pay record; and an oath of allegiance to his country not lightly given. Assign him to a ship along with other men and you have a crew. The crew will man the ship's battle and control stations; cook the food and wash the dishes; do the laundry, make fresh water, handle cargo, predict weather. A multitude of skills brought together, from machinist to stenographer to electronics technician. Every member of the crew will know how to fight fires, how to administer first aid, what to do in case of nuclear attack. Every time a man is lost through transfer or discharge a new man must be trained to take his place.

There is the ship: a multi-million dollar floating city. It must be kept in a state of absolute repair at all times; propulsion plant, radar, pumps, hundreds of miles of electrical wiring and piping, 500 electric motors constantly running and 50,000 gaskets in tight seal. The ship must be provisioned and stocked, able to stay at sea for extended periods without any advance notice; 18,000 items in the store rooms repair parts, light bulbs, scouring powder, pencils.

Organize several ships together and make a squadron or flotilla or task force or fleet. Organize schedules with care; the earth is large, and over 70 percent of its surface is water. The oceans of the world stretch out for vast distances; it takes a fast ship almost two weeks to go from Long Beach to Taiwan, which is less than a day's steaming from the Philippines; four days from Japan to South Viet Nam, which is less than a day from Singapore. Events develop swiftly-where will our forces be needed? When Lebanon was threatened by communist takeover, the Premier requested military support from the United States; it took only 12 hours to put the Marines on the beach, and a crisis was averted without the firing of a shot. A massing of communist troops in Laos prompted the government of Thailand to ask for our assistance; the amphibious assault ship Valley Forge (LPH-8) moved quickly into position and put marines ashore by helicopter. Where next? The Navy is somewhere nearby.

Plans for the future: call for every ship on station overseas, have a replacement ship back home undergoing shipyard overhaul or extensive training; for every ship in the fleet that is nearing the end of its usefulness because of old age, design and build whatever replacement may be required tomorrow or five years from tomorrow.

This is readiness. The Navy is ready. But -- why, then, is readiness?

Readiness is because: of communist aggression in Korea; in South East Asia, in India; of the brutal suppression of the Hungarian uprising; of the incredible wall past which the residents of East Berlin may not go, under pain of death; of the incomprehensible slaughter of millions of peasants in China,

Readiness is to keep the seas free, for ourselves and for the world. The United States consumes over one-third of the industrial production and nearly one-half of the raw materials output of all nations; 99 percent of these commodities are carried in ships

Readiness is our future. Yours: your children's. Admiral George W. Anderson, former Chief of Naval Operations, put it this way:

"Twenty-five hundred years ago, Themistocles said, "He who commands the seas commands everything." Today this is still true. Let us lose command of the seas, and we become an island, isolated and alone. Let us lose command of the seas, and the wheels of the incomparable industrial complex which provided us the tools needed to make us the most powerful free nation on earth will grind to a halt - - slowly, but inevitably. Let us lose command of the seas, and ultimately we will command nothing, not even our own destiny."

Public opinion is an immense force; and its currents are as inconstant and incomprehensible as those of the atmosphere. Nevertheless, in free governments, it is omnipotent; and the statesman is to find the means to shape, control and direct it. According as that is done, it is beneficial and conservative or ruinous. The public opinion of a civilized world is International Law; and it is so great a force, though with no certain and fixed boundaries, that it can even constrain the victorious despot to be generous, and aid an oppressed people in their struggle for independence.

Above all, the love of country, state pride, the love of home, are forces of immense power. Encourage them all. Insist upon them in our public men. Permanency of home is necessary to patroitism. A migratory race will have little love of country.

See that we use these powers for good purposes - to teach, exhort, ennoble the people, and not to mislead or corrupt them. Corrupt and venal orators are the assassins of the public liberties and of public morals.

It is the men of will and action.....not the men of pure intellect, that govern the world. The greatest of these moral forces is faith, which is only true wisdom, and the very foundation of all government.

A theory learned from some experiences in life is that some good emerges from every bad situation. The full understanding of what good will transpire from this assassins deed may never be comprehended. America and the rest of the world is experiencing a realistic revival in patroitism. The loyalty of our youth as a result of this sad occassion leaves little doubt in my mind that we stand together for world peace and our Country. Perhaps, we could say that the Supreme Ruler turned our heads.

As a Navy man, I appreciated President Kennedy's personal interest in Navy affairs and his understanding of readiness problems.

This interest was most recently demonstrated by his "on site" inspection of a Polaris missile firing. He viewed this test from the USS OBSERVATION ISLAND as the submerged nuclear submarine USS ANDREW JACKSON unleashed the missile.

My own opinion is that he outstanding leadership and courageous efforts to maintain a world peace was proven at Cuba. In my lifetime, the highest peake of readiness has been achieved in the United States and this is creditable to him.

Today, the Nation mourns the loss of a beloved son, a great American and Champion of Liberty. Finally, you have been a witness in these days of mourning to the forces of public opinion in action. To me, it was like losing a "big brother" who left his Massachusetts home and made his mark on the world from his kind office....

M.S.T.S. modifies two LSD's for shipment of Saturn V stages from production and test sites in California and Mississippi to the launching site at Cape Kennedy. Two ships of the LSD class-USNS POINT BARROW and possibly USNS TAURUS will be modified by MSTS with additional equipment and instrumentation to carry the large stages such as the S-IC booster which measures 172 feet long and 38 feet in diameter. Using the "Roll-on rodl-off" technique, the stages will be loaded and unloaded on specially designed modular transporters. Total combined shipping weight of transporter and S-IC is 260 tons. Under the agreement with NASA, the first shipment could occur as early as 1965. The ships will carry the S-IC and S-IVB stages of Saturn V between production and testing sites.

World Reports In 1964 the U.S. and West Germany will jointly launch a destroyer designed to be a test ship used operationally in the proposed Atlantic Alliance Nuclear Fleet. Despite powerful opposition from France and England newpaper accounts indicate Turkey, Italy, Belgium, Holland and Greece may share in this project... H. M. S. DRAGON

DRAGON; light cruiser; 4,850 tons; 16 Aug 1918 to 8 June 1943; damaged by torpedo off the coast of Normandy. Constructive total loss(In Polish service), this laconic record in the Royal Navy's Statement of Losses 1939-45 is the obituary of a ship that served faithfully in two World Wars and the troubled years between them.

H.M.S. DRAGON, the fourteenth ship to wear the name in the Royal Navy, was one of three ships of the DANAE Class. She was built by Scotts at Greenock, Scotland, being completed in 1918. Upon completion she served with the 5th Light Cruiser Squadron(Harwich Force). Along with her sisters, DANAE and DAUNTLESS, she remained in this service until 1919. Her service between wars varied; Atlantic Fleet 1919-25, Empire Cruise 1923-24, Mediterranean Fleet 1929-28, China 1927, Refitted 1928-30, Atlantic and West Indies Station 1930-37, Reserve Fleet 1938. DRAGON was due to be scrapped being "overage and obsolete" but the outbreak of WW II saw her back in service. She again served in various capacities until she was transferred, along with DANAE, to the Polish Navy. AS O.R.P. DRAGON, she earned the Battle Honour, Arctic 1944. While patroling in the channel she was heavily damaged by a torpedo from a German midget submarine during July 1943. Reaching port, she was found to be beyond economical repair and was used as part of the breakwater in Siene Bay.

DRAGON, a light cruiser of 4,850 tons on dimensions of 445 x $46\frac{1}{2}$ x $14\frac{1}{4}$ feet, carried an armament of 6-6%, 3-4% AA, 15 smaller guns and 12-21% TT.

During her service on the West Indies Station, DRAGON supplied various ship markings on many covers. These exist with an unofficial postmark, regular ship markings and with the "regulating office" handstamp used as a cancelling device. During World War II, O.R.P. DRAGON had an official postmark, an oblong metal date stamp showing a ship silhoutte and reading POLSKA MARYNARKA WOJENNA - date and ship number - AGENCIA POCZTOWA (Polish Navy Postal Agency). DRAGON was number three. There were two types of this cancel and several rubber stamp markings.

DRAGON is represented in my album by the postage stamp used in Poland in 1945 and by several covers. The most interesting, to me at least, is a cover from Rotchester-Chatham dated 28 May 1937, bearing a cachet and photograph of the ship. The cachet reads: HMS DRAGON BIDS GOODBYE-DECOMMISSIONED TODAY. The cover also has the "regulating office" stamp in blue with the date of 28 May 1937.

LONGER SUBMARINES

Navy to lengthen three submarines to allow for weight increases. The three submarines involved, FLASHER(SSN-613), GREENLING(SSN-614) and GATO(SSN-615), will be lengthened by 13 feet, nine inches. All three are under construction at the Electric Boat Co. Of the THRESHER class, these submarines have heavier propulsion plants than their sister ships, and have heavier "sails" (bridge structures) than called for in the original ship

USNS NORWALK, FPO, N.Y. was originally built as the Norwalk Victory and since her conversion by MSTS as a fleet ballistic missile resupply ship she will be assigned to the Atlantic Fleet. Undergoing conversion also is the FURMAN VICTORY at the American Shipbuilding yards at Lorain, Ohio, a second ship of this type to be converted.

The Navy minesweeper TANAGER is scheduled for active service again with the U.S. Coast Guard Reserve, Reserve Training Center, Yorktown, Virginia., about July 1st. Her minesweeping gear is being removed at Baltimore. This ship will establish a new ship type in the Coast Guard - WTR. "W" designates an ex-minesweeper from the Navy and "TR" denotes "Training Reserve". These so-called Navy types are expected to be stationed at New York, Boston, Norfolk and one or two major seaports on the Pacific Coast.
