WEST GERMAN KENNEDY FDC ASSISTANCE ... EDITOR'S VIEWPOINT FIRST GEMINI MISSION IS KEY TO INITIAL TWO-MAN FLIGHT THIS YEAR..... The first unmanned Gemini orbital flight (April 14th) from Cape Kennedy is the first step in the drive to orbit two men by the end of this year. The project - with primary emphasis on its manned orbital rendezvous and long duration missions, now calls for 12 flights. The first manned flight will be a simple three orbits. The second will extend to four days, and the third to seven. Rendezvous tests will begin with the sixth mission; then the space agency plans to alternate the long duration missions of up to two weeks with the rendezvous docking experiments. Three flights are scheduled this year, Four are planned for 1965 and five for 1966. The Gemini spacecraft is similar to the basic shape of the earlier one-man Mercury spacecraft. It is wider in diameter at the base and longer, and it contains 50% more volume than Mercury. There are two batches on top of the cabin to provide for entry and egress of astronauts. Two man Gemini Teams will perfect many techniques required for Apollo effort. Gemini promises a string of spectacular feast over the next two years as well as a row of covers. After the second un-manned shot this summer the first Gemini manned flight should be off to a flying start with veteran space traveler U.S. Air Porce Major Virgil I. Grisson and LCDR John W. Young, U.S. Navy - a former test pilot. LCDR Young has two world records for time-to-climb in the 3,000 meter and 25,000 meter events in an F4B aircraft Then, two-man teams will fly every three months on a stepped-up schedule that according to some news sources could start leaving Russia far behind in the moon The second un-manned test set for this summer, will rocket a fully equipped capsule on a ballistic flight in a check out of all systems and the parachute waterlanding recovery operation. My initial Gemini Philatelic Report is corrected and revised accordingly insofar as covers for the "do-it-yourself collector" is concerned Morris W. Beck, P.O. Box 116, Whitewater, Wisconsin is the Universal Ship Cancellation Society's Cachet director. Mr. Beck will service your stamped self-addressed 6-3/4 white envelopes for each of the Gemini U.S. Navy Recovery Ships on a continuing basis. This means to keep an adequate supply of covers on hand with him. His service fee is 2¢ per covers and is used to defray the cost of printing materials and re-mailing your covers to the U.S. Navy Recovery ships or the cover coerdinator on each coast. Covers received in excess of the Gemini requires will be serviced for . some important Mr. Don Schultz, 1225 B. Marquette Street, Appleton, Wisconsin ship event. is sponsoring a cachet on behalf of the USCS Nuclear Ships cachet . This means that he will apply a cachet to your 6-3/4 envelopes(without postage) providing you send him sufficient postage for their return via first class U.S. mail and include a 2¢ per cover servicing fee for the chapters treasury. When you received your cacheted but unserviced covers back from Mr. Schultz you may mail them to: M.L. Nickel, P.O. Box

30 30, Cocoa Florida for servicing and postmarking on the appropriate dates of significant Gemini events at a 10¢ per cover service fee. Foreign collectors using 5¢ U.S. postage on their un-scaled, stamped self-addressed 6-3/4 white envelopes will obtain the best results. These envelopes must however be marked "PRINTED MATTER" to insure postal return. A light weight or cardboard filler is recommended for the best possible results. Here is a collectors opportunity to do something for himself while plenty of time exists and before the manned flights commence. Collectors when writing to me for information are requested to include a long stamped self-addressed envelope....

Here is the final Project Gemini report being sent to you as requested announcing the details on how to obtain U.S. Navy Gemini Recovery Force ship covers commemorating the first un-manned flight involving recovery ships.

Collectors who follow these instructions (as corrected) will probably receive at the appropriate time excellent results from their efforts.

Covers sent to Mr. Beck will be postmarked on board the Navy Gemini Recovery ships. It is important to point out that collectors should send along a stamped self-addressed postcard so that they may be kept informed of the dwindling supply of envelopes being used as the events occur. Nothing in philately can be guaranteed but all of us realize your investment and appreciate your interest in Our Navy.

U.S.C.S. is providing it's members and friends with up-to-date news coverage, equisite low-cost cachets and the necessary details to allow collectors "to do it yourself."

The U.S.C.S. cachet sponsors are doing excellent work and their services are seldom duplicated at the 2¢ per cover service fee, which is used to defray mailing and printing expenses. Please find enclosed an envelope containing two sample of our artistic cachet director's work. Isn't it beautiful?

The first manned Gemini Flight will probably occur late this autumn and receipt of two more stamped (long) #10 envelopes will keep you informed of the details. No charge.

U.S.C.S. was organized in 1932 and is composed of members interested in collecting ship covers particularly covers and cachets from U.S. Navy ships. Corresponding with these USCS friends during the past few years has enabled me to become proficient as a do-it-yourself collector thus keeping my collecting expenses to a minimum. U.S.C.S. LOG(copy available upon request) is included in the membership dues. Our members are the folks who contribute the LOG material and some writers are leading authorities on cover subjects.

U.S.C.S. has prospects for additional chapters in Delaware, Florida, Missouri, Maryland, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Texas, Washington, Connecticut and our neighbor Canada. If, your state is not represented just drop me a few lines for assistance or further information. Perhaps, you are interested in the leadership and organization of one of these proposed chapters. From my experience in organizing USCS Hampton Roads Chapter #63 I can truthfully say that chapters can be organized and effectively carried on with little extra effort.

Most of our members are sincere individuals like yourself collecting "one-of-a-kind" with a duplicate cover for trading purposes. Many also collect other items like postcards, stamps, matchbook covers. FDG and space covers.

Should you decide on USCS membership please complete the endorsed membership application blank and mail it together with your remittance to the USCS Secretary noted on the back. If, you do join please be sure to drop me a line as I would like to send you a spaceship cover as a token of my friendship.

"TUESDAY"-Best Day-Financially

Why has the National Aeronautical Space Administration selected Tuesday as the traditional day for Mercury manned space flights and will this tradition be retained in the Gemini flights?

Has it been a sentimental choice? Not at all, NASA officials say. The decisions to choose Tuesday has been a

cold, hard one- financially.

Weekend launches of U.S. astronauts would likely attract a greater audience that the mid-week jaunts around the globe. However, they would cost hundreds of thousands of dollars more if they came on Saturday and Sunday.

More than 25,000 military and civilian personnel are involved in the launching of an astronaut whether he goes 3,6

or 22 orbits.

There are 21 tracking stations around the world, manned by about 500 technicians as well as five tracking ships.

Also scattered across the world are hundreds of other technicians who play a vital part in the program.

Before the six-orbit flight of Schirra, there was some discussion among NASA officials of a Sunday "space show" so more Americans could watch on TV, but the idea was junked when NASA bookkeepers totaled the extra cost.

RESEARCH THAT IS PAYING OFF'. : : - Dear Mr. Skelley: I would like to thank you for two covers which you sent recently and for the information contained in Navphilately. Your publication has been of great help to me and it was through the articles on the ships of the U.S. Coast Chast and Geodetic Survey, U.S. Air Force ships and U.S. Coast Guard that I started collecting covers from Government owned and operated ships other than those of the U.S. Navy. There are a surprising number of such ships, but it takes a bit of digging to find out about them. Following are some notes of interest and also some questions which some of your readers may be able to answer: M.S.T.S. - USNS NEW BEDFORD (T-AKLI7) was used as the supply ships for the Texas Towers off the coast of New England. With the decommissioning of these radar stations, the services of NEW BEDFORD were no longer required so the ship was scheduled to be transferred to the U.S. Navy where it was to be used at the Navy's Torpedo Station, Keyport, Washington. It was reported in transit to the Pacific Coast about Aug 63. Later in the year, it was reported that Western Boat Bldg. Co, Tacoma, Wash., receeived a contract for the conversion of the NEW BEDFORD. That is the last I have heard of the AKI-17. USNS AKL-43 was another FS being used to supply the Texas Towers. It was scheduled to be t transferred to the Coast Guard (according to Jane's Fighting Ships) in late 1963. USNS MIZAR (T-AK-272) was based at Seattle, Washington, and operated as a cargo ship between Seattle and Alaska. In the fall of 1963 (late fall I believe) it was announced that the services of MIZAR would not be needed on the Alaska - Seattle Run. I believe the next word on MIZAR came in Mar 1964 when I read in the newspaper that the MIZAR was scheduled to sail from Seattle for New York. I believe the MIZAR left Seattle about March 8th. I would appreciate any word as to the present status of these three ships. Perhaps some of your readers know more details. Editor's Note: MIZAR in operation as far as is known U.S. COAST & GEODETIC SURVEY SHIPS: Your article in the past Navphilately covered this subject quite well but I have a few notes which might be of interest. . USCGS Ship SCOTT - Covers returned with the n notation - "Ship Decommissioned" return to sender. USCOS Ship MARMER(ASV-89) - New address: 102 West Onley Road, Norfolk, Va. Mail for the Marmer addressed to the ship at the St. Petersburg, Florida address was not forwarded but was mailed from the USCGS HYDROGRAPHER with the notation that the Marmer was now at Norfolk. USCGC Ships WAINWRIGHT & HILGARD using same address at MARMER now. Note that we have two ships here. I assume that the two ships act as a team with one T.O. According to the New York Times, these two ships are operating in the Gulf of Mexico(primarily off the coast of Texas, I believe) charting sunken ships. Addresses needed: USCGS PEIRCE - Covers sent to Mobile address returned with the notation "Return to sender/address unknown" WHITING, a sister ship of the PEIRCE. It was commissioned after the PEIRCE and did not appear in your list. NEW CONSTRUCTION: GIBBS SHIPYARD, JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA: Two Class I hydrographic ships 303 foot length named USCGS DISCOVERER AND OCEANOGRAPHER. MARIETTA MFG.C., Two Class II survey vessels 220 feet long named USGGS FAIRWEATHER and RAINEER. I don't know how close to completion these four ships are but I suspect that the OCEANOGRAPHER and FAIRWEATHER are nearly finished. U.S. COAST GUARD: Your previous articles on the Coast Guard have been very informative but it does not seem that anyone has made a list of Coast Guard Ships from which one can obtain covers. The Fleet Post Office does not seem to handle mail for the smaller ships so collecting covers from Coast Guard ships can be difficult unless one knows the homeports of these ships. Following is a partial list of Cpast Guard ships based in the Pacific Northwest. In collecting covers from these ships one should remember that they DO NOT have post offices on board but I am sure that they will apply their return address stamp to covers mailed from their ships. I am also sure that they will NOT appreciate a deluge of mail or any unreasonable requests. (All ships designated USCGC) USCG LIGHTSHIP 604-Columbia River Lightship MODOG (WATA-194), Goos Bay, Oregon c/o Goast Guard Depot, Tongue Point, YOCONA(WAT-168), Box 836, Astoria, Oré. I hope to have a more complete listing available later. It might be interesting if some of your readers could prepare a similar lis of Coast Guard ships which are based near their homes. M.L. Campbell, Chief Boatswain, U.S. Coast Guard, C.C. USCGC WHITE BUSH was kind enough to write me a note telling about his ship, so I would like to quote part of his letter. "The Coast Guard Cutter White Bush (WAGI-542) is a 133 foot coastal tender. (next page)

There are eight of this type cutter, all of which were transferred from the U.S. Navy.

This vessel has a 31 foot beam, draws nearly 9 feet of water and has a 600 ton displacement. Two 300 HP Union Diesel Engines drive this cutter throught the water at cruising speed of ten knots. The White Bush services nearly 200 aids to navigation annually on the Washington and Oregon Goast from Grays Harbor to the Coquille River and up the Columbia and Williamette Rivers to Vancouver and Portland, respectively. Would certainly enjoy having you visit the White Bush. Finding men like Chief Campbell certaily makes our hobby more enjoyable. U.S. ARMY TRANSPORTATION CORPS: Yes, the Army does have a "navy". At least two cargo ships, the HICKORY KNOLL and the LCOL JOHN U.D. PAGE are operated by the Army to experiment with improved methods of cargo handling. Both ships are based on the Atlantic Coast. Perhaps some reader can supply a mailing address for the two ships. The HICKORY KNOLL looks like a C-1 type ship converted with special cargo handling facilities. The LT.COL PAGE is classed as an "Army Beach Discharge Lighter (Ocean going)."

Any information about these or any other ships operated by the Transportation Corp would be appreciated.

I hope that some of this information can be useful. If there is enough interest I hope to have more information available about ships operated by some of the other government agencies such as the Federal Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, Alaska Native Service, Pacific Islands Trust Administration and the Army Corp of Engineers.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT: Reading an article entitled "Bonanza U.S.A." in the magazine section of the Virginia Pilot Sunday paper I noticed it contained a list of publications readers could write for and obtain FREE. The item that caught my eye most was "Hobby on the Rocks" an illustrated guide to rock collecting available from the Shell Oil Company which encompasses science and history. It tells how to collect and where to find specimens. Wouldn't it really be a boost for some other large corporation to offer a similar guide on "Ship Cover Collecting" particulary U.S. Navy ships with post offices. Oh; well, a poor man's dream.

INTERPEX this year was by far the greatest ever held. The new and beautiful Americana Hotel in downtown New York was the setting. Present were about 45 dealers from all over the United States selling every type of stamp, coin, cover and many other ite items interesting to the collector. The U.S. Post Office had its usual fine display of material. There were about 200 panes on exhibit showing everything from the space theme to all kinds of topicals, freak stamps, covers and many other collector items.

Bill Ronson stole the show with his display on the now famous First Official U.S. Rocket Mail that was fired from the USS GRAYBACK (SSG-574) in September 1958.

WATCH YOUR PLANNING CALENDAR .. By now most of the more seasoned collectors know that the Navy Press releases concerning "DEEP FREEZE" are available in mid-July each year. This year, it is not my intention to send out this information by "special sheet" in July because I anticipate taking my vacation the first three weeks in August and the importance of other pressing matters that require my attention in the cover program. COVER ALBUM WEEDS - Information from USCS members and other interested friends indicates a greater interest in cachets that postmarks by some of the newer collectors. It is not my intention to tell you here and now what you should or should not collect but rather to commend the efforts of a couple Detroit collectors for their outstanding work on the 1964 THRESHER Memorial Cover - My hat is off to Harry Benedict, Bob Szczepanski and Al Wickard for the fine effort to produce something of artistic value and historical significance. I would like to point out that stock designs do serve a purpose but the danger is that they are often "overworked" resulting in far too many cover events of little or no importance. Quality and NOT quantity builds better collectors and collectors. For example: Some of the covers that have emerged from the 30's commemorated everything from Women's Rights; N.R.A and even Valentine's Day plus a barrel of junk that keeps rotating at many cover auctions The West German Postal Administration(Deutsche Bundespost) does not prepare first day covers. Collectors have to prepare the covers themselves and send them to a Post Office (Postamt) which uses a special First Day Cancel or postmark. These Offices are published 2-4 weeks before the day of issue. The Postamt, 53 Bonn 1, West Germany always uses a First Day Postmark and sometimes a second office that has a special relation to the new stamp. Collectors have to send the covers within three days of issue to the Post Office using the postmark. Only postcards and letters are allowed - no "Printed Matter." For instance, a stamp is issued on April 10th, I buy them at my local Post Office and prepare my covers which I have to mail at latest on April 12th to the published post office address. The outer cover is addressed "Postamt, 53 Bonn 1, West Germany and in the left corner of the outer envelope I write "Ersttagsspempeling". Some days later my FDC's come back cancelled with the special postmark dated April 10th. If a FDC has a circle in pencil in its left part, they strike a

A BRIEF HISTORY OF GUANTANAMO BAY - Guantanamo Bay first received historical recognition when Christopher Columbus entered it on his second voyage to the "New World" and spent the night of 30 April 1494 there. He and his Spanish Adventureres were looking for gold, and finding little, left the next day.

Subsequently, la Bahia de Guantanamo (Guantanamo Bay) enjoyed a reputation as a natural port for pirates, privateers and fishermen. It was the scene of some fighting between the British and French in the 17th and 18th centuries.

In 1741, the bay was used as a base of operations by British Vice Admiral Edward Vernon, Commander of the British West Indies Squadron, who undertook an attack on Cretagena, Columbia. The expedition was a failure, however, because the troops and sailors fell victim to tropical diseases.

In 1898, with the declaration of war between Spain and the United States, the attention of the U.S. Government was focused on Guantanamo Bay. On June 10th of that year, a battalion of U.S. Marines was landed at Fisherman's Point to establish a naval base of operations for the campaign against Santingo de Cuba, 40 miles to the west. The Marines were joined by Cuban allies under the command of an experienced soldier, Colonel Enrique Thomas, and together they defeated superior Spanish forces and captured the bay.

This operation was credited with pinning down some 5,000 Spanish troops at Guantanamo City, thereby preventing them from going to the aid of the Spanish forces at Santiago.

This factor materially contributed to winning the war. Our campaign against the Spanish in

Puerto Rico was also launched from Guantanamo Bay.

It was apparent that Guantanamo Bay would be valuable as a coaling station and a base of operations for the Atlantic Fleet, especially during the winter months when the weather was cold and uncooperative in the North Atlantic. This weather undoubtedly accounts for so many of the old U.S. Navy ship covers being stamped "GTMO BAY" or "GUANTANAMO BAY" between the killer bars in the postmark. Accordingly, the land on which the base is now located was leased to the United States in 1903 by the newly formed Republic of Cuba. The first lease agreement was signed by President Estrada Palma for the Republic of Cuba and by President Theodore Roosevelt for the United States to effect the establishment of a coaling and naval station. The lease agreement involved a total of 28,821 acres of which approximately 9,000 acres is covered by water.

Another treaty, negotiated by Condell Hull and signed by Franklin D. Roosevelt on May 29, 1934 has the effect of giving the United States a perpetual lease on the base. It can be voided only by our abandoning the area or by mutual agreement between the two countries. The United States has exercised control over the Guantanamo Bay without actually owning it

for more than half a century. However, its sovereignty still rests with Cuba.

The impact of World War II resulted in a reappraisal of United States overseas bases.* The impetus provided by the attack on Pearl Harbor has continued to this day, although the building program is now aimed primarily at replacing temporary wartime structures and facilities.*Thus Guantanamo, among others was earmarked for expansion. The rest of the story concerning Guantanamo Bay you know.

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The word Mayday stems from the French word "m"aidez" meaning "Help me!" It was adopted as a distress call or signal for ships and aircraft by International Radio Regulations because it is brief, clear and unmistakable, and can be pronounced in most languages.

Here is a list of ships that have used their ship's seal on covers when it has been request—ed. Please bear in mind that some ships may not use same as different CO's and PIO's do no not sanction the use of them. I conducted this list as an experiment and through inquiring of these ships apply their seal as a matter of course but on others it has to be requested. This list is by no means complete but I have said it was an experiment and am submitting it for the benefit of anyone that may be interested:

SIGNS OF THE TIMES

With the influx of new shipmates into ship covers we have been fortunate to acquire some wery able, willing and creative hands into the ranks of our hobby. Several have expressed a desire to assist in creating artwork desire designs to assist our cachet sponsors. This is particularly good news since ship streamling has outdated some of the ship designs. The trend among the majority of collectors shipwrecked on our shores from other phases of philately indicates a cacheted cover that tells a story in color plus a neat and clear postmark. All of us want to stick with the 6-3/4 white envelope for economy reasons. Although the monarch and #10 envelope sizes are collectable and acceptable - the 6-3/4 size prevails as the most popular.

Again I would like to repeat myself and say that I do not know of another hobby as informative, interesting, adventurous and economical as collecting ship covers particularly in the naval cover area.

A nutshell version of what I mean can thus be summed up: " the collector sets his own pace and governs his own collecting habits." For example, this statement is not necessarily true in stamp collecting as some other agency or group of individuals decide how many issues the topical trend will bear plus a few extras to boot. Many times it appears that some of the stamp producing municipalities have a "custom-made" program for the topical collector depending on the topical not tropical winds.

Here is our future and these brief statements are signs of the times (1) better covers can be anticipated with improved cachets (2) a greater demand for quality postmarks (3) a few more USCS Chapters in 64 (4) less individualism or localism in cover projects with greater emphasis on USCS Chapter projects (5) greater harmony and understanding among is forseeable (6) more USCS reinstatements (7) consolidation of important news and infor tion into the USCS LOG for collector benefits (8) fewer "cover album weeds or junk covers" (9) more trading or exchanging and fewer cover sales and (10) the brightest years in our hobby since the conclusion of World War II are yet to be enjoyed as we travel with U.S. Navy ships. Membership in U.S.C.S. means friends. Remember your only as far away from assistance with your covers as a 5¢ stamp NAVY BEGINS GEMINI/APOLLO RECOVERY TRAINING:
